# 2016 Past President's Report .....

**Beta Sigma Psi** has some very vexing problems facing us as a National Fraternity as well as a local Active/Alumni Chapter. For example, there has been a general reduction in membership of the Active chapters especially our older chapters such as Alpha and Beta.

While Scholarship has been exemplary, in many cases it has been undermined by upper-classman with high grades moving out of the chapter house, and dragging down the average of those men left behind. Why don't we consider bonus reductions in cost for 3rd and 4th year students.?"

Fraternity recruitment is down across the country due to very bad press. Dorms are building luxury suites for student, charging outrageous prices for room and board, and at the same time slandering some of the Greek Activities such as a quest for scholarship

Quite often the fault is ours! Many of our chapters have sub-par chapter houses, without much of a plan for renovation or moving to a new home. We must as a National Fraternity develop a plan to frontend load dues/initiation costs so that perhaps in the Junior/Senior year national dues can be held to a minimum. We must rely on our Alumni to help the local chapter and develop planning for the future.

It is recognized that many times our house bill is 60 to 75% below what the dorms charge. For example, at Colorado State University the cost for room, a 20-meal plan, and tuition (instate) is \$11,500/semester.

How does that compare with your house bill, and are you publishing that information to Associate Member Recruits? What are your grades like and how does that compare with the graduation rate from the University? What is your chapter's strengths and have you identified your weakness? Have you put them in writing?

Make no mistake – fraternities across the country are under attack by the media, and by your biggest competition – your host university.

I have suggested to the National Board that we add to the three's -Spiritual, Scholastic, and Social the 4th S — Service. Service to the community, church, and other areas of philanthropies that can make a large difference to an organization or need that need your help.

Read the attached comments about How Do We Become Number One, and very simply begin making the changes necessary on your campus, to make you the best Fraternity.

# 2016 Treasurer's Report .....


I always find it interesting to look at an organization's P&L to get a sense of the membership's priorities, and ultimately, what they value.

When coming into the office of National Treasurer I was glad to see that two of the largest expenses for the National Fraternity are leadership development and programming for our chapters, as well as maintaining connections and communication with our alumni.

An ample surplus from the year before last was used primarily in these areas, as well as for some one-time expenditures that had been put off in previous years. As a result, we operated at a net loss this past fiscal year, but we saw expenses closely match revenues over the two year period. Going forward we'll seek to deliver the same value while being mindful of costs.

Another measure to help understand the activities of an organization is cash flow. The largest single expense for the National Fraternity continues to be liability insurance for the active chapters, and while it is for the most part reimbursed by alumni chapters, this large outlay often creates a cash flow challenge in the fall semester.

My focus will also be on finding ways to better predict our revenue streams and costs from year to year and start

every year off in a strong position. Overall, I am very excited at the efforts I see being put forth by our National Fraternity and hope to continue the work done by my predecessor Lowell Gordon, to ensure we are in a strong financial position to meet our objectives and adhere to our values.

# National Looks to Save Costs

Would you be willing to accept a digital PDF Gold Rose in place of a printed copy?

One of the steps that national has taken to help better inform the alumni and to help present an improved image to out-siders that see our magazine, is to go all color, increase the coverage of all chapters, feature articles on our outstanding alumni, more color photos, expanded coverage of our awards dinner at MEF each year, and expanding the size of the Gold Rose Magazine to increase coverage.

Instead of two smaller black and white issues, a process that doubles the cost of postage and increases the cost of printing, we have gone to an expanded all color magazine that is sent out only once a year.

We also have decided to send our magazine to the larger Lutheran Congregations that lie within the six-state area where we have chapters, as well as the Lutheran High Schools.

This means more printed copies than what we used to print. We hope this expanded mailing will help spread the word about Beta Sig to the Lutheran youth within the key six state area, who for the most part, know nothing

about Beta Sigma Psi, and even if they have heard of us, it quite likely it is a biased view of us, what with Hollywood and the Media constantly distorting the truth about fraternities.

The decision to mail the Gold Rose to the larger congregations and Lutheran high schools within the six state area where we have chapters, has increased our costs to print and distribute the Gold Rose. At our last national board meeting in Kansas City, the decision was made to look for ways to reduce costs associated with the Gold Rose.

We don't want to eliminate color, and we don't want to reduce the size too much, so it seems that one of the best ways to cut costs would be to reduce the number of Gold Rose magazines that have to be printed and distributed.

To those that we want to reach to inform them about what Beta Sigma Psi is all about, a printed copy is the better choice. But, for many of our alumni, especially the more recent graduates who are very much into the new digital age, I would think a digital copy of the Gold

Rose might be preferable to a printed copy.

If we had a sufficient number of alumni that would be happy with a PDF, then we could start to make some significant cost reductions without reducing the size and quality of the current magazine.

So, what this is all about is a request to hear from all of our alumni, young and old, that would be willing to forgo the printed Gold Rose for a digital version.

If you are one of our alums that would be willing to help the cause, please email me - the editor at: zetaalum139@kc.rr.com and tell me that you want a digital copy of the Gold Rose rather than a printed copy.

This one option has the potential to save National Beta Sig a sizeable amount of money in reduced costs, so I encourage you all to please make a decision and reply if this works for you. This is really a small matter for most individuals, but collectively a big matter for those of us at the National Level.

# Beta Sig GPA Above Average At Nearly Every Chapter

Grades are what the college experience is all about, or at least it should be, what with the exhorbantly high price of a college education today. Some of our chapters are consistently at or near the top of the GPA charts on their campuses and that speaks highly of our fraternity.

However, a few of our Beta Sig chapters have been falling short of their set goals recently, but it is not really what you might be thinking the problem is. There is a trend now that many of the upper classmen, the ones typically with the highest GPA averages, are hurting the chapters because many are not included in the house average. We all know that the entering freshman, while they may have high grades in high school, are most susceptible to lower GPA's as they transition to college, which then pull down the house averages.

As I said above, the juniors and seniors in all fraternities are now moving out of the fraternities to live the good life, free to shake off the restrictive rules and regulations imposed by the fraternities they joined. What this does is eliminate from the house average the older brothers that have proven themselves scholastically and who generally have the highest GPA's.

If Beta Sig upperclassmen move out and do not pay any dues to the chapter or the national fraternity, then their grades cannot be counted in the chapter GPA. This means that the chapter GPA is more heavily influenced by the freshman and sophmores, who as I said earlier, typically have more of the lower grades. Only one or two freshman with really bad grades can drastically reduce the chapter GPA and that has happened at several chapters recently.

As an example of this situation that we are dealing with now, Zeta chapter dropped way down into the third quartile rankings (about 16th place) for fraternities because of one associate with really bad grades not being removed before the deadline and many upper classmen with excep-

tional grades not included because of the dues issue. Had the associate been dropped and the upperclassmen been included, Zeta would have been in the top quartile, at about 4th or 5th place. So, this is a really critical issue for all chapters to watch.

All fraternities today are having to deal with the upperclass move out, but they seem to be dealing with the grade issue in different ways. We have a couple of chapters that need to re-evaluate the way in which they are dealing with the out-of -house upperclassmen to take advantage of their better grades. One way to do this is to have the out-of-house upperclassmen pay their dues to national to meet the requirements of the university to be considered a member of the fraternity.

The National Board discussed this upper class move out trend at some length at our recent Board Strategy meeting last September in Kansas City. We think we have a plan for our chapters to follow that will help them become more competitive with the other ftraternities on their respective campuses. Time will tell but by our next issue, we should be able to report the results of the new approach to qualifying upperclassmen in our overall chapter grades.

# National Board Strategy Meeting in Kansas City

# Returning To Old Policy on Chapter Activation Certificates

Back in the early 60's, our past National President Larry Edwards started a new national fraternity policy for assigning badge numbers to new members.

The rule was simple – all activation class members' names were to be listed alphabetically (by last name) and the numbers applied (from smallest to largest) consecutively by last name - from A-Z. The certificate number is preceded with a letter indicating the chapter.

However, with the passing of time and as leadership and our secretarial staff changed over and over, the rules were ignored and National, by default, let the chapters assign badge numbers, and NOT in a uniform way.

We now have a significant number of alumni with duplicate badge numbers and worse, we have

dozens and dozens of unused numbers because some chapters assigned numbers before the associate members were qualified for activation.

As frequently happens, sometimes associates do not make their grades – or they decide to drop out of school and the end result is that we have been left with a lot of skipped over numbers. If badge numbers had been assigned by the National office after the associates were official-

ly approved by their corresponding universities and the chapter, the skipped number problem would not have happened.

To add to the problem, quite a few chapters during the past decade, have frequently been delinquent in reporting data to the National office as they are required to do. When asked to produce copies of their files to National, we often only get excuses or NO response at all. This lack of co-operation with National is disturbing to this old school guy and it really needs to stop. If the leaders in our chapters and alumni chapters are not willing to comply with our rules, then we should ask them to step down and let others who will accept responsibility take over.

Because of this non-compliance in the past, the current National data base is an absolute mess. Trying to resolve the problem has been multiplied and compounded because of the haphazard way in which the chapters have carelessly assigned numbers. I have been told that some chapters assign numbers according to GPA, I think others do it according to the buddy system. Regardless of the way, there definitely does not seem to be

any consistent method being used. To correct the problems of the past and to ensure that our data base is properly maintained, the National office will again be in charge of assigning all badge numbers. Badge numbers will be assigned only after, a) the National Secretary receives proof that all candidates have officially met the GPA requirements of the University and Chapter, and b) only after all chapters have submitted the required activation forms to National on each member as required for activation.

Three years ago, I approached the National Board with the idea that the National Fraternity be responsible for framing and double matting all certificates, plus laminating all Lifetime Membership Cards and presenting them to the new members as part of their activation. I felt that it would be good fraternity PR, plus a moral booster for our new members, to be able to display a beautifully

framed membership certificate in their public image if disproved the plan.

rooms while in school, and later on their office walls for outsiders to see. This could also be be good for our played where the general public could see them. Once the treasurer and board were assured that the costs could be sustained on an annual basis, they unanimously ap-

In March of 2013, I went to the local Michaels frame shop to get an es-

timate to have our activation certificates framed, using a hardwood, lacquer finished frame, nonglare glass, foam core backing for the documents, a dust cover on the back, and a saw-tooth hanger. Their full price to complete the job the same as we get now, was \$280 each. If you timed your order to conform to their 50% off sale, which occurs a couple of days each month, then it would be about \$150 each. My contact here in Kansas City, an old friend from my K-State days, agreed to do them for us at \$40 each including packaging and delivery to the chapters. We have the certificates printed, sent to the framer and they do the rest.

We are getting a tremendous deal thanks to my friend and he is doing this as a favor to us. If the young men in our chapters wish this to continue, then they are going to have to do a better job of following the rules passed down from National.

Framing will be done twice a year, once in the *spring and again in the fall.* The names and date of activation, along with the forms for activation shall be sent to the National Office as soon as possible so that we can get the printing and framing done quickly. Your cooperation in requested.

Justice Karmeier is another example of a fellow Beta Sig, a midwestern boy, that grew up in a rural environment, was educated in a one room school house and after a lifetime of hard work and dedication, rose to heights in his chosen field unknown to most of us. This is not to say that many of our brothers are not successful, it is just that this is truely a remarkable feat.

Karmeier, 76, who grew up in rural Washington County before graduating as valedictorian from Okawville Community High School in 1958 and going on to earn his undergraduate and law degrees from the University of Illinois, was sworn in Monday, October 31st, 2016, as the 120th chief justice of the Illinois Supreme Court.

In his position, which he'll fill for three years after being elected by his fellow justices on the seven-member court, Karmeier will serve as the top administrator for Illinois' judicial system, which includes more than 900 judges statewide.

Karmeier, a Republican who become a judge in 1986, received high praise from his fellow justices for his integrity, work ethic, sense of humor and collegiality.

"He respects and honors the traditions of the history of the court," said Justice Anne Burke, a Chicago Democrat. "He respects and honors his own personal background, and he respects and honors his colleagues. To put it simply, Lloyd Karmeier is the salt of the earth."

"When I ran for this office a decade ago, I made only one promise," he wrote. "It was a promise to the People of Illinois and the voters of the Fifth Judicial District that if elected, I would decide every case free of outside influence and based solely on the law and the facts. I have honored that pledge."

Perhaps the highest-profile decision Karmeier has written since becoming a justice was the 2015 ruling overturning a pension reform law the General Assembly passed in late 2013. The court ruled unanimously that it violated the pension protection clause of the Illinois Constitution.

State Sen. Dave Luechtefeld, R-Okawville, who's been friends with Karmeier for more than six decades and played high school basketball with him, attended the ceremony. Luechtefeld said Karmeier's integrity is without question. "He does what he thinks is right all the time," Luechtefeld said. "And he's been that way since he was young."

Justice Karmeier and his wife live in Nashville, Illinois. They have 2 children and 6 grandchildren.

Fellow Beta Sig, Brian Bosma, (Beta '77), has been, and still is, living a life that is full of outstanding accomplishments.

After graduating from High School in his home town of Beech Grove, Indiana, Brian attended Purdue University, where he joined Beta Sigma Psi National Fraternity, (Beta '77) and graduated with an Engineering Degree.

Three years later, in 1984, he received his Juris Doctor from the Indiana University School of Law. That same year he became a member of both the Indiana State Bar and the American Bar Association.

He was elected to the Indiana House of Representatives in 1986. His fellow Republicans elected him the House Republican Minority Floor Leader (1994 – 1999) and was then selected to serve as the Republican Minority Leader from 2000 to 2004 and again from 2006 to 2010.


In 2004, when House Republicans assumed a 52-48 majority, Bosma was elected Speaker of the House by his peers. After serving as Republican Leader following the 2006 and 2008 elections, Bosma was again elected Speaker of the House where he remains today.

Brian was born in Beech Grove, Indiana on October 31, 1957. He was the grandson of Dutch immigrants. His grandfather came to America along with his 11 brothers and sisters, was a dairy operator and founded *Bosma Dairy*, where Brian worked growing up.

Brian's parents Margaret and Charles Bosma, were both professionals and successful in their own right. His mother was an elementary school teacher. His father, also a Beta Sig (Beta Chapter 1940-1943) was an Army Officer in WW II, a businessman and an Indiana State Senator, from 1962-1980.

After passing the bar, Brian began his law career as an associate attorney, joining the firm of *Bingham Summers Welsh and Spilman* where he worked from 1984-1985. He then became a legislative adviser in the Indiana Department of Education where he served as the legislative liaison to Indiana Superintendent of Public Instruction, (1985-1986).

After leaving the state education department, he returned to the legal profession and joined, as a partner, the Indianapolis-based

law firm of Kroger, Gardis and Regas, LLP. His law practice is concentrated in the areas of complex business and municipal transactions, municipal finance and environmental matters. He chairs the Government Practice Group of Kroger Gardis & Regas, and serves as general or special counsel to dozens of municipalities and business entities throughout the State of Indiana.

Mr. Bosma is a founding director of Bosma Industries for the Blind and serves as the Chairman of the Bosma Visionary Opportunities Foundation. He is a frequent author and lecturer on environmental, corporate, construction and municipal matters, and has served for nearly two decades as a lecturer for young lawyers preparing to take the Indiana Bar Exam in the areas of corporations, partnership and agency law.

Brian and wife Cheryl call Indianapolis home. Their daughter Allison is a Purdue graduate and son Christopher is a medical student at the Indiana University School of Medicine.

# Zeta Alum, Mayor Larry Wolgast Revitalizing Downtown Topeka

Mayor Larry Wolgast was among a small group of people who began meeting every Friday morning in 2009 to talk about downtown Topeka and its future.

Wolgast, then a member of the Topeka City Council, said those meetings evolved into a more organized, structured process that birthed Heartland Visioning, a downtown summit and, ultimately, the 2012 council vote that resulted in the infrasture improvements to S. Kansas Avenue.

Like many in the community, he has carried the torch for downtown through disappointing council votes, doubts about the project's economic viability and months of torn-up streets.

Today, with such projects as the Cyrus Hotel in the offing, "sold" signs in most downtown buildings and nearly complete beautification projects, Wolgast said it is time for "breathing deeply" before moving forward.

The path forward isn't clear-cut from a city perspective, he said, because it isn't always evident what the city should be doing or even what needs to be done to ensure success.

Numerous questions have arisen about the city's role. "I would say we're looking at that," Wolgast said. "The city has a commitment to downtown. It's an economic development issue. "I have been looking at what other cities do to support their downtowns.

When there are events, what is the role of the city? It's like with parades — there's the cost, the police, all the barricades, all these things that have to be done. How do cities do this? I don't think it's appropriate to expect the private sector to do this, or DTI (Downtown Topeka Inc.). It's something that the city is doing."

Wolgast can roll out many questions that need to be tackled: how do you handle events, who pays for them, how do you get the right mix of tenants and work to become an entertainment center, to name a few. Even something as simple as who develops a walking map to tie the downtown area in with the Kansas Statehouse, which sees 100,000 visitors each year, can be complicated.

It isn't as simple as doing step one, two and three, he said. It requires planning, and he said he has been talk-ing with others, both in the city and in a variety of organizations, about working together to plan. Some of that planning is happening. Vince Frye, president and CEO of Down-town Topeka Inc., said, for example, that the city is participating in a committee about the possibility of mov-ing Topeka's farmers market downtown, along with DTI, state officials and other organizations.

Frye said DTI also is meeting with Greater Topeka Chamber of Commerce officials about what types of businesses should be recruited downtown and how to do so.

"Those things are all happening. We're all talking, we're all on the same page in what we would like to see," he said. "From that stand-point, there's a real cooperative effort. "A lot of the places that we visited on inter-city visits, the city plays a key role in their downtown as far as staffing responsibilities, entertainment, farmers markets, a lot of things of that nature.

That has not been the case really here, but there's no reason it couldn't be. We have certainly talked with the mayor, the city manager and others that there might be an opportunity for the city to be more involved in making some of those things happen."

Wolgast said it will take some planning and decision-making to determine the city's role. Some cities have created departments that work on their downtowns, for instance. Moving forward, is important to determine the city's involvement.

"We take our time," he said of the process. "We all want it now. Immediately. But I think we worked by taking this a step at a time —now we're at this point, now we start taking those next steps."

Wolgast, who is familiar with the many steps, patience and diligence required to get to this point, is excited to see the change in. attitudes. Those will contin-

ue to change because there have been years of a "this won't work" and "this can't happen" feeling, he said.

"Vince will tell you they've had calls from developers in Kansas City. They see this is where things are happening now, and they want to be part of it," he said, adding that as restaurants and other businesses open downtown, changes will continue.

"I believe when we have those excellent restaurants, they will have business," he said. "They left downtown because there was no down-town left. But it's coming back.

I've had a couple of people tell me since the Sunday stories, 'I never felt Kansas Avenue would come back or happen, but now I see it is.' It takes a while to change your thinking about it."

# **Scott Gesell Receives Beta Sig's Top Reward The Lienemann Award**

Acceptance Speech by Scott Gesell '78 - Delta Chapter

Let me open by saying "Thank you" and letting you know what an honor this is for me to be selected for the Lienemann Award.

Understanding the importance and the commitment of the man for whom this award is named, and looking at the list of prior recipients, most of whom I know or have known and many of whom I have had the pleasure to work with over the years, I realize how blessed we are as a Fraternity to have had these men in our organization.

I want to recognize a few people who attended the awards banquet and by their presence made it extra special for me. First, my wife – Betty. She is the love of my life, and has been a strong supporter of our fraternity. She never questioned or challenged the time or commitment of our resources to Beta Sigma Psi. But for Beta Sigma Psi, we likely would never have met and most certainly would not have developed a relationship.

To my best friend and fellow pledge brother, Ross Nelson (and his lovely wife, Shawne), and my pledge brothers Jay Holle and Mark Hahn, thank you for being a part of my life and being part of the celebration with me – I would not have been receiving the award if not for you and our fellow brothers, nor would it mean as much to me.

To my nephew, Ian, who is an active at Epsilon chapter, a special thanks. To the men of Delta chapter, whom I have had the pleasure to get to know and work with these last few years — thanks — you remind me of why Beta Sigma Psi is so important and so relevant today. Beta Sigma Psi truly is a family affair for me — 2 brothers, a nephew and 3 cousins have all been members.

Times have certainly change since I pledged in the fall of 1977. While we, as a fraternity, have had our ups and downs over those years, we are at a point of success on many fronts that appears unprecedented in our history.

We have as strong a membership top to bottom, and financially we are on the soundest footing, that I can ever remember. We have some great leaders and advisors with our organization – starting with Rudy (Ristich) and John (Hatfield)and including the rest of the boards of our various entities.

I would be remiss if I did not give out a special salute to Larry Edwards. He has stepped in time and time again to grasp the rudder and help chart the course. He has challenged and encouraged me to get and stay engaged. He has been the greatest teacher for me regarding the history of our fraternity.

As well as things are going today, we cannot and should not take it for granted that this will continue. Fraternities in general are constantly under attack from the public and also from certain campus administrations, and often, with some justification.

In the ever changing, politically correct world in which we live, the old adage of "boys will be boys" is no longer a recognized justification for less

than good behavior. Societal expectations have altered the historically acceptable activities of many fraternities. Additionally, religiously affiliated entities have not fared well in many instances.

But still, we currently prosper. One can ask why and there are a number of reasonable responses, but to me it breaks down to a few important attributes of which I hope and pray we do not lose sight or focus.

The first is found early in our constitution — an understanding that a life rooted in Christ is the only true goal of human existence. Bob Hillard constantly brought that concept home as a leader in our fraternity when I was coming up through the ranks, and it still resonates today.

Second, is the understanding of what it means to be Christian gentleman, and more importantly, knowing when one has gotten off that path, and making appropriate amends and corrections to set things right. Our focus on the three S's is unique in the fraternity world, and an understanding of the important balance between the spiritual, scholastic and social aspects of college life helps us to develop well-rounded members.

The third is a desire to be a leader by exam-

ple in our chapters, schools and communities. When these base elements are brought to bear, we have a product to offer that is not available in any other form on our respective university campuses, and there is still a significant group of young men and their families who are looking for this culture and experience.

We are not necessarily "better" than other fraternities because of these attributes, but we do stand apart and do

avoid many of the pitfalls and distractions others experience, and we have an organization that is able to support its members when support is needed.

Last, we have been blessed with some dedicated members who continued to devote time, talent and resources to our organization throughout their adult lives.

We have a permanent challenge in the life of our fraternity – something that we have had to confront and deal with since day two of the existence of our organization – the "Lutheran clause" – the requirement that all active members be in communion with the Lutheran church. This is complicated enough by the fact that the various Lutheran organizations are not "in communion" with each other. Great debates have raged, and continue to rage about whether this should remain a requirement of our organization, and, if so, what does it mean, and how is it applied.

To best understand this issue, one needs to study the history of the founding of our fraternity. We were formed to give Lutheran men an option that allowed them to meet the requirements of the Lutheran church with respect to membership in a "secret society" and to promote the values of a Lutheran-based life, rooted in the Christ element, in the daily college life. At the time of our founding, there was not an option or alternative in the Greek community that was acceptable to members of the Lutheran church who strictly followed its teachings.

We need to understand that we joined the fraternity, Beta Sigma Psi, not that the fraternity joined us. What we joined is very clearly spelled out in our governing documents. One does not have to be in communion with the Lutheran church to become an associate member of Beta Sigma Psi, and one does not have to be in communion with the Lutheran Church once one becomes an alumnus of Beta Sigma Psi or to remain active in the affairs of the Fraternity. However, if one is to be an active member of Beta Sigma Psi, one must be in communion with the Lutheran church. We are not a social fraternity for Christian men, or a Christian fraternity for the social man — we are a social fraternity for Lutheran men.

I am a lawyer by profession, and often spend a good part of my day rationalizing marginal or bad behavior and try to make it look or sound acceptable or even good. After 32 years of practice I understand the process of rationalization, its strengths, weaknesses and shortfalls. I was also a history major in undergrad, and have spent a great deal of time studying history — and its most important lesson — those who do not study and understand history are doomed to repeat it.

If you are an Active member of Beta Sigma Psi today, and do not self-identify as a Lutheran, then I challenge you to show me how you meet the baseline requirements for membership in our National fraternity. I recognize that at a number of our chapters the university administration has required us to take the "Lutheran" provision out of the charter for the local chapter. That being said, if one is committed to our fraternity and what it stands for, one must square how they meet the requirements for membership. The Army, Air Force and the Navy are all military organizations, and they often undertake joint operations, but members still identify with the branch of service in which they serve, not an amorphous "military".

There have been "Christian" fraternities before us — look at Sigma Chi and ATO as examples, who chose to abandon that element of their formation — fine organizations for the most part in their own right, but not true to the purposes on which they were founded. I know that if you stand for nothing, you fall for everything, and I am worried as I see those who seek to erode the pillar on which this organization was founded and stands.

I know Luther did not want those who followed his teachings to call themselves "Lutherans" but he acknowledged that if by doing so they announced a commitment to the concept of salvation by faith alone, he could accept the practice. I recognize that there are other Christian organizations that share this belief system, but they were not a part of the founding or purpose of Beta Sigma Psi.

We have the ability to amend our governing documents, and have over the years, and we could take out the "Lutheran clause" – element

of our requirements. I posit to you that if we do that, then at the same time we need to change our name from Beta Sigma Psi because we will have so altered our purpose that we will no longer be the organization that meets the objectives or purpose for the founders had when we were established.

While this appears to be a challenge for some, I think it is a great opportunity for us to continue down a path to success. Being "in communion" with a Lutheran church today is not the undertaking it was in the past. Today, one can be "in communion" by simply attending and participating at many Lutheran churches. My challenge to each Active member is to find that Lutheran church in which you feel most at home, and be in communion with it during your days as an active.

I think this is also an opportunity for us as an organization to meet our obligations as a social fraternity for Lutheran men. It has been pointed out to me, and I would confirm it by my life experiences, that those who come to the church by their own choosing are often more involved and engaged than those who are "born" into the church through their family ties.

When one joins by choice and selection, they have a tendency to make the experience a greater part of their life. The Lutheran church today faces the challenge that it is in many places dying a slow but steady death. If we infuse the church with new members who are proven leaders and engaged in their faith as a daily part of their life, we help stem that trend and ensure that we are providing the church with good leaders for its future.

I have been blessed to experience many emotional highs and lows as part of my involvement with this organization. One of the darkest days in my life was when I got the call that we were closing Delta Chapter at the University of Nebraska – Lincoln.

We lost our focus and commitment, and we paid the ultimate price. Every time I went back to Lincoln after that or attended a Beta Sig event there was a hole in my heart and in my experience. Thankfully, and through the hard work of some very dedicated people, that hole was filled with the re-chartering of the chapter and the witnessing of its success and growth.

The men in that chapter today are the Beta Sigs our mothers wanted us to be, and I am very proud to have them as part of our family.

I recently attended the Delta Alumni Golf Tournament – it was great to see the turnout and again experience the fellowship that only comes when two or more of us are gathered together – in this case, 70 of us. I had a great talk with one of my brothers, Dan Lindstrom, at the post golf outing after the tournament at the house.

Dan was a year ahead of me in the house, played football at Nebraska, and was a guy I admired and respected during my time in the house. We had a great discussion about how the house had positively impacted our lives at a critical juncture, and set us on the road to the rest of our life in a must better context.

Last Spring was a very successful semester for the fraternity from a scholastic stand point. We finished the semester with a house GPA of 3.16, which was up 0.10 from the fall semester. # 2016 MEF Awards

One of the highlights at the Membership Education Forum (MEF) is the awards banquet. 
